him the Queen's Commendation for Brave Conduct.

The chairman, Clr. Mrs. J. R. Kirby, said she wondered whether on that occasion L.-Cpl. Wilson, who is serving with the Dragoon Guards, felt frightened or if he felt like the hero in a Foreign Legion film.

operating in armoured cars in the role of reconnaissance troops, for much of the time in Aden and lately in Cyprus and Northern Ireland, the 4th/7th Royal Dragoon Guards are in the process of changing back to tanks.

Next March the regiment move to Germany for what is expected to be a three-year tour of duty, but may well be longer. By then all squadrons will be equipped with Chieftain tanks, Stalwart amphibious load carriers, and 432 armoured personnel carriers.

At the moment there is no end of to-ing and fro-ing from their base at Omagh, Northern Ireland, as batches of men leave or return from courses to re-learn the techniques of tank warfare in preparation for the change over.

In addition, one squadron is due shortly to return from Syprus, and they, too, will have to go into the training programme before the advance party leave for Germany in February.
